# **COVID-19 PANDEMIC 2020**

Since day one of this global health crisis, MMCC has been on the front lines providing critical services to support our community in need. COVID-19 has impacted our communities in ways that we could have never imagined.

In a matter of a few weeks, **30 million** people had filed for **unemployment**. Many were depending on **food pantries** like ours to feed their families.

Through donations, we provided over **1,000** families a week with **emergency food relief** through our pantry.

We used **Google Classroom, Google Hangouts** and **Zoom** to provide job readiness training, career exploration, Servsafe certification, high school equivalency classes, adult basic education classes, and provide information about resources, health and wellness, and keep our youth engaged and connected.

We served over **400 preschoolers** with **remote learning** to prepare them for Kindergarten.

We kept our **Afterschool** children engaged with **live-streamed** enrichment classes, incredible instructor-led **videos**, and all kinds of digital events.

## Mosholu Day Camp

Summer 2020 presented an unprecedented challenge in providing camp to our participants. While planning took place before New York State issued clearance to even open camp, our staff worked tirelessly in creating systems that offered a safe and COVID-free environment. Once given clearance to open, Mosholu Day Camp was the first camp in Orange County to receive a permit. It became one of the only camps in New York State to run without interruption for 8 consecutive weeks, and provided a summer filled with fun and laughter for over 200 children. Parents have been incredibly thankful that their children had the opportunity to participate in camp and were thrilled with the precautions that were put in place to allow their children the chance to experience activities like swimming, boating, tree climbing, archery and sports.

### **MOSHOLU DAY CAMP**

Located on beautiful Lake Cohasset, Mosholu Day Camp enrolls girls and boys entering grades K-6. This camp offers affordable fees and serves families from the Bronx, Manhattan, Westchester, Rockland, and Putman Counties.

### **EXPLORER DAY CAMP**

This site, on Upper Twin Lake, serves our COMPASS and SONYC children from our DYCD-funded afterschool program and voucher campers. The facility has a large multi-purpose building, a beautiful waterfront, a huge field for archery and sports, as well as a theater and many small buildings that house a variety of camp activities.

### **TEEN ADVENTURES**

The perfect combination of a travel camp, sports camp, arts camp and traditional sleepaway, our Teen Adventures Camp offers our oldest campers a great summer experience. Trips throughout the summer take teens to the area's best water parks and adventure venues. Teens learn horseback riding, rock climbing, canoeing, and much more from professional trainers. Teens experience sleeping under the stars during camp sleepovers, as well as an extended 3-day trip.

### **CAMP SUNSHINE & SUNSHINE TEENS** For special needs children

Our fully mainstreamed program is designed for youngsters who demonstrate developmental disabilities and/or are limited in their social/emotional growth. We provide services to children with a range of classifications/diagnoses: Learning Disability, Speech and Language Disability, Asperger Syndrome, Pervasive Development Disorder (PDD-NOS), Autism (mild to moderate), Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD), Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), Downs Syndrome and Intellectual Disability (mild to moderate).

This inclusive program is designed to address the needs of the camper by providing a small camper-to-counselor ratio. The children are integrated into the appropriate group setting and have the opportunity to participate in all camp activities. We work with parents and campers to encourage and support social and emotional goals.

# **Child Development Center**

### **PREPARING FOR SUCCESS**

The ultimate goals of the Child Development Center (CDC) of Mosholu Montefiore Community Center (MMCC) are to: prepare children for cognitive, physical, and social-emotional success in Kindergarten and beyond; support their families in responding to their educational and developmental needs; and provide the information and services families in the community need to become self-sufficient. Success will mean that: 1) children have the foundational knowledge and skills to become lifelong learners in Kindergarten and beyond, 2) families are empowered to advocate for their children and be active partners who extend learning into the home, 3) families are self-sufficient, and, 4) staff grow professionally, feel supported and valued. We know that an ongoing commitment to learning is crucial for a successful program. We therefore emphasize and implement ongoing professional development for our staff members and support them in their professional and personal needs.

### A CURRICULUM FOR ALL CHILDREN

To accomplish these goals, we provide children with opportunities for higher-order thinking and problem solving. This includes art, music/movement, science, math, block play, social studies, reading, writing, dramatic and physical play, and field trips. Activities are based on observing children's interests and developmental assessments, as well as health, family background/ culture, learning styles, attitudes, and abilities. Learning environment and curricula are designed to meet the developmental needs of all children, including children with special needs. Our curriculum is Creative Curriculum. We utilize Brigance to screen the children and Teaching Strategies GOLD to assess their development and progress three times a year.

### **WE ENGAGE FAMILIES**

CDC also believes that engaging families as partners is the key to achieving our goals for our children and their families. We engage families through workshops, parentteacher conferences, volunteer and decision-making (Policy Council) opportunities, a fatherhood program, family goal setting, and community events. We extend learning from school to home by providing parents and children with meaningful home activities. As part of MMCC, CDC is also able to connect families to a wide range of additional support services, including day care, afterschool, education and employment programs for young adults/older adults, benefit screenings, senior programs, and food stamp enrollment. We are a "one stop shop" for quality community-based services for both children and families. At CDC, family comes first.

## **Afterschool Programs**

### **AFTERSCHOOL**

Kindergarten-5<sup>th</sup> grade - 1,400 elementary school children were cared for at the MMCC main building and local elementary schools. The programs meet from the end of the school day until 6pm. We keep young people safe and engaged!

Children are served through a combination of feefor-service, vouchers from the Agency for Child Development, and other funding sources. Children with special needs are welcome in the afterschool program. Admission is based on intake interviews and specific criteria.

### **COMPASS/SONYC**

MMCC provides afterschool programming for more than 2,700 elementary and middle school children. We manage18 sites, operating year-round with a total of \$8.7 million in funding.

### **EMPIRE STATE**

Funded through the state initiative, MMCC provides afterschool care for approximately 400 elementary and middle school students.

### CORNERSTONE PROGRAMS NYC HOUSING AUTHORITY (NYCHA)

MMCC operates 8 NYCHA community centers in the Bronx and Manhattan. The program serves more than 3,000 elementary, middle, and high school students in afterschool and evening programming that provides teens with arts, sports, lounge and game rooms, fitness and weight rooms, and young adults with GED and ESL services.

### **BEACON PROGRAMS**

We operate 3 Beacon Youth Centers in our community, serving more than 5,000 participants. Facilities are instrumental in keeping young people safe, as they are open Monday through Friday afternoons and evenings, as well as Saturdays. Beacon provides academic, leadership, and sports programming, as well as the MMCC College Bound Success program.

### **BOYS & GIRLS CLUB**

### A SAFE PLACE FOR TEENS

MMCC operates Boys & Girls Clubs that are free to the community. The clubs offer sports, game rooms, art, cooking, computer, homework help, performing arts, and educational classes.

MMCC Boys & Girls Club programs are committed to providing teens with a safe place to learn and grow. Teens build relationships with caring adult professionals and participate in life-enhancing programs and character-developing experiences that foster hope and opportunity. Our Boys & Girls Club program serves more than 2,700 children and teens each year.

In 2019-2020, MMCC managed 7 Boys and Girls Clubs in the Bronx.

# COLLEGE BOUND FAMILY CHOICE

### **COLLEGE BOUND PROGRAM**

The College Bound Program helps high school students learn about college choices, narrow down programs, fill out applications, apply for financial aid, receive professional counseling and visit colleges. Each year over 700 students and their families are helped by the Center.

### MARIE CURIE HIGH SCHOOL FOR NURSING & ALLIED MEDICAL PROFESSIONS

Now in its 10th year, our very successful school serves students in grades 8-12. The school presently has 500 students.

We continue to have a high school graduation rate of 88%.

### **FAMILY CHOICE**

MMCC Family Choice program supports life-enhancing opportunities and counseling for the at-risk and underserved, focusing on 100 special needs students and their families by providing:

- Individual support to families with the middle and high school application process, which includes finding the appropriate setting for families and their child.
- Conducting workshops for families, which include establishing connections and outside services, understanding their child's IEP, standardized test, and the high school selection process.
- Information to parents about student rights

# WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

### LEARN & EARN IN-SCHOOL YOUTH PROGRAM

Assisted 56 low-income high school youth with career development and vocational training skills to help enter the workforce through career exploration, internships, and job placement.

### TRAIN & EARN OUT-OF-SCHOOL YOUTH PROGRAM

Assisted 75 young adults who are unemployed and out-of-school, to enter the workforce. Includes a culinary training program and advanced training opportunities in CUNY schools.

### **INTERN & EARN**

Served 135 out-of-school 17-24 year olds with counseling, job training, career development, vocational skills, and paid internships.

### HSE (GED) NEW OPTIONS PROGRAM

Prepared 150 students for the TASC test to obtain their high school equivalency diploma (HSE).

### SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (SYEP)

Enrolled approximately 2,185 youth participants (a New York City best) in more than 250 job locations throughout the Bronx and Manhattan. Participants, ages 14-21, learned about the world of work while earning minimum wage, working 20-25 hours per week for 6 weeks. MMCC Youths worked for every major hospital in the Bronx, nursing homes, police precincts, the NYS courts, NYC probation systems, various day camps/child care, and fast food locations such as Burger King, and McDonalds.

### **OPPORTUNITY YOUTH**

Provided 46 young adults, ages 18-24, who are neither enrolled in school nor employed, with a 14-week paid internship in Neighborhood Development Areas (NDA) numbers 7 and 8.

### NDA EDUCATION SUPPORT HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH

Provided 23 high school students with academic intervention, social, and academic supportive services.

All programs listed above were funded by NYC Department of Youth & Community Development

### **CERTIFIED NURSING ASSISTANT (CNA) PROGRAM**

Through a partnership with Hostos Community College Continuing Education Department, we are able to serve 30 students annually, ages 18-24, who are interested in a career in the health industry. Due to COVID-19, we only served 18 students because we had to shut down in March.

### **SENIOR CENTERS**

MMCC operates 3 senior programs for well, older adults (age 60+). These locations are MMCC's main building, Marble Hill Houses, and Fort Independence. The programs serve more than 1,300 seniors. In addition to lunch, members enjoy socialization, classes in art, drama, crafts, current events, social action, book discussion, technology, fitness, friendship clubs, and trips to fun and interesting places.

Senior centers also provide case assistance for entitlements and support services.

#### **HEALTHY FAMILIES**

In our second contract year, we served more than 350 families.

## **SPORTS & ENRICHMENT**

### SATURDAY ACADEMY

Saturday enrichment classes are one of MMCC's most popular programs and are always seeking new and innovative enrichment programs to add to its curriculum. There are three 8-week sessions.

Children enjoy classes that include: gymnastics, ballet, musical theatre, art, ceramics, music lessons, graphic design, computer skills, coding, healthy cooking, and sports (basketball, baseball, karate, gymnastics, soccer).

### **TAEKWON-DO SCHOOL**

MMCC's martial arts program offers boys and girls a fun way to achieve fitness and focus, while learning selfdiscipline and socialization skills. Participants start out as beginners and earn belts as they progress.

### BASEBALL

The MMCC baseball program went through some changes and prioritized learning and loving the game. This year, about 100 children, ages 4-10, had a chance to play and develop their skills, and learn about teamwork.

### SWIMMING

Through a cooperative arrangement with the Lombardi Swim Center at Fordham University, 700 children learned how to swim! Classes are held on Saturdays and Sundays, with an adult learn-to-swim class on Wednesday nights.













# SUPPORT SERVICES

### SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (SNAP)

Our SNAP professional assists clients with the red tape associated with the food stamp program. We screened 2,214 potential clients, and 610 eligible households received SNAP benefits.

This program has been welcomed at the center by the community and seniors who cannot travel to the Human Resource Administration offices.

### ENGLISH FOR SPEAKERS OF OTHER LANGUAGE S (ESOL)

MMCC believes that adult education is vital to our community. Our Adult ESOL Education program focuses on education and citizenship. Classes are offered in English as a Second Language (ESL) and Civics to help immigrants become United States citizens. The ESOL programs serve more than 300 adults each year and is located in our main building and at four satellite sites.

### **IMMIGRANT LEGAL SERVICES**

On Wednesdays from 10am-5pm, MMCC provides an attorney specializing in immigrant services to assist and guide individuals through the myriad of paperwork and processes needed by immigrants in our community. Last year we serviced 302 individuals.

### **VITA/TCE VOLUNTEER TAX PREPARATION**

Individuals and families that qualify can receive NYC Free Tax Prep assistance from an IRS-certified VITA/TCE volunteer preparer. In 2019-20, we helped prepare 2,877 tax returns.

MMCC's Food Pantry was created to help those suffering from food insecurity. In 2019-20 MMCC helped feed over 3,100 families; offering families nutritious option and giving them the opportunity to select their own food for their own personal needs.

### DOVE (Domestic and other Violence Emergencies)

DOVE program design combines our philosophical commitment to an assets, strength-based approach with case management practices to help individuals and families address their needs and overcome barriers of poverty and violence. The objective is to combat violence by providing services and referrals. The program works along side our Healthy Families and this year we were able to serve over 20 families.

### **OPEN TENT (UJA Initiative)**

In partnership with the Pleasantville Community Synagogue (PCS), in Westchester County, this program engages community members who are often underrepresented in the broader Jewish community and looking for places where their needs can bet met through a unique lens. Our goal is to seek out traditional and non-traditional Jewish individuals and families, who identify as interfaith or LGBTQ+ -- reflective of our mission to seek out the underserved and multicultural groups to build acceptance. This year we were able to offer 11 events and serviced over 40 interfaith and LGBTQ-IA families.
